 - Drug Trafficking: It appears that a mostly Nigerian organization (or organizations), recruiting mostly Bulgarian mules/couriers (and sometimes Romanian and Lithuanian mules/couriers), moves cocaine from Latin America and Caribbean to Europe, often via Africa¹

C. Scope and Size

- a. Estimated size of network and membership
 - Unable to determine exact size from open source information, however the number of countries in which the group operates would suggest that size is not negligible.
- b. Countries / regions group is known to have operated in. (i.e. the group's operating area)
 - As pertains to Central America and the Caribbean: Jamaica, Brazil, Argentina, Ecuador, Colombia, Uruguay, and perhaps Panama²
 - **Globally:** much of Africa, Bulgaria, Serbia, Turkey, Norway, Sweden, UK, Germany, Netherlands, Italy, Greece, Spain, Czech Republic³

D. Leader Characteristics

- a. Who is/are the leader(s)
 - All that is known from open source is that Nigerians appear to be the group's leadership. Bulgarians hold positions of "lesser authority," mainly in recruiting and/or training other mules.⁴
- b. Leadership timeline
 - Information not found.
- c. Leadership style (autocratic, diffuse, etc.)
 - Probably diffuse.

E. Organizational Structure

- a. Topology (cellular, hierarchical, etc.)
 - Diffuse network.

 - **Bulgarian mule network**: There has been a trend of Bulgarian recruitment as mules and couriers for several years now, but it continues to be strong, with Bulgarian

authorities acknowledging that hundreds of Bulgarians act as couriers annually. ⁵ This appears to be because Bulgarians are "cheaper" than other ethnicities – because of economic conditions, they agree to lower prices for moving the drugs⁶ (between 800 and 2,000 Euros depending on the destination). ⁷ This would seem to be corroborated by the fact that, while most arrested Bulgarian mules are young, there have also been elder people and pregnant women among the apprehended. ⁸

Nigerian familial/ethnic friend network: It appears that part of the reason this group
has such global reach and capacity is because of relatives, however far removed, or
ethnic friends who are living abroad in various places.⁹

c. Logistical

 - Couriers' routes are constantly changed to deceive not only the border authorities but also the police services of the states through which the drugs are transited.¹²

 - Cars Although it appears to be rare, in some cases when cocaine was being transited to Bulgaria or other places in Europe, mules used cars.¹³
- ii. Sea
 - Commercial Cruises used extensively by mules¹⁴
 - **Private Vessels** yachts, speedboats¹⁵

 - Commercial Flights used extensively by mules
 - **Private Craft** small, low-flying aircraft¹⁶

 - Extensive use of concealment, especially by mules, to hide drugs in various items; this includes cocaine: hidden in necklaces, in capsules that are subsequently swallowed, in hidden compartments in bags/suitcases, ¹⁷ and hidden by use of specialized clothing (The cocaine had been smeared on this specialized clothing, which was then worn under regular clothes, according to Bulgarian Mafia unit of the Main Directorate on Combating Organized Crime). ¹⁸

 - Unable to determine from available sources.
- c. Additional insights
 - This is the kind of network that often operates under the radar. The West African connections as well as the Bulgarian links give it potential significance.

Other Notes

• Regarding mule transport of cocaine, there appears to be a trend away from mules swallowing the cocaine toward mules concealing the drug in various items. According to Bulgarian organized crime authorities, "the current tendency indicates a decrease in the number of 'swallowers,' at the expense of couriers or 'carriers.'" This is because the swallowing method of transport is not only riskier, but less cost-effective. Bulgarian authorities report that the new strategy of the Nigerian cartels is to send many couriers, each carrying a small quantity of narcotics so that should a courier be apprehended, the loss to the criminal organization is minimal.²¹
