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# A. When the organization was formed + brief history

- This drug trafficking group consisted of military and police officers who worked out of Las Americas International Airport as security personnel.
- The group attempted to take over the transportation of cocaine and heroin between the Dominican Republic and neighboring Puerto Rico after the arrest of Jose Figuroa Agosta.
- Members were arrested in an anti-narcotics operation on December 2, 2010, when narcotics
  agents stopped a small plane carrying 145 kilos of cocaine. Most of the officers responsible for
  the trafficking operation were dishonorably discharged from service, while others were forced
  to switch to other units.<sup>1</sup>
- A similar operation was busted at the same airport earlier in 2008, but it is unclear whether the two cases are from the same group.<sup>2</sup>
- It is unknown if elements of group are still operating at airport.

## B. Types of illegal activities engaged in,

  - Drug trafficking.

  - Members used their positions as airport security officials to smuggle cocaine and heroin onto small planes for transportation to Puerto Rico.

Although many members of the airport trafficking group were arrested, it is unclear whether or
not others continue to operate at Las Americas International Airport as it is a hub for drug
transportation. None of the members who were arrested received harsh punishments, which
raises questions about the seriousness of Dominican Republic government efforts to stop drug
trafficking.
